Deborah Shadd has been hired as the director of leadership development. In this role, she will work to support the development of both individual and institutional capacities at ATS schools through

the design, planning, and implementation of learning



opportunities and resources intended for both current and emerging leaders.

Shadd brings with her a broad range of experience in designing and implementing capacity-building initiatives for diverse users and audiences, having managed training and professional development programs across the globe. She is passionate about creating and supporting educational programs of excellence that are designed and delivered in ways responsive to context-specific needs.

Shadd holds a master's degree from Northwest Baptist Seminary (Trinity Western University) and a PhD from the University of Ottawa. As she begins her new work with ATS in March 2022, Shadd will continue to reside in Kitchener, Ontario.
